CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

Update skills and knowledge of professionals in the discipline. Goals and objectives will be specifically directed at individual professional enhancement rather than the acquisition of general discipline knowledge or methodologies.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Join us for CCIRA 2024, *Branching Out, Staying Rooted*. The vision for *Branching Out, Staying Rooted* is to help teachers explore, grapple with, and maybe reconcile their literacy roots

with all of the changes that are happening in education today. We are offering a balance of sessions that will encourage teachers to explore their beliefs, but also challenge them to branch out - try new things, explore a new perspective, or reach their audiences just that much better. There are three main branches that we are exploring at the conference, and the speakers will each be connected to a branch.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- 1. Discuss current topics in education as presented during the conference.
- 2. Apply the strategies and techniques presented in their own classroom.
- 3. Collaborate with other professionals in order to learn new skills and exchange ideas.
- 4. Synthesize the information gathered in order to grow as a professional educator.

TEXTS, READINGS, INSTRUCTIONAL RESOURCES:

All materials will be provided on-site.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

- 1. Attend 15 hours of conference sessions over 2.5 days.
- 2. Actively engage in discussions related to the content of the conference with the intent that appropriate strategies learned at the conference will be applied.
- 3. Complete an online reflection discussing what was learned at the conference and how it will be applied to the participant's daily instructional routines. Due to Lori L. Conrad by midnight, April 15, 2024.
